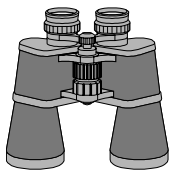


MVAS Programs

Membership meetings and programs are held each month at the Village at Northrise, Hallmark Building, 2882 N. Roadrunner Pkwy. Meetings begin at 7:00 PM. Programs begin immediately following the business meeting and announcements.

Sex, Lies, & PowerPoint Slides: The Secret Lives of Common Birds. January 18. MVAS member Nancy Stotz will describe some of the fascinating behaviors of a few of our most common birds. You might be surprised by what's going on in your own backyard!

Field Trips

Field trips are free and open to the general public. Entry fees to some areas may be required and driving costs are shared. On all field trips wear appropriate clothing and bring water, sunscreen, and binoculars.

South Valley Hotspots. January 21. On this trip we'll visit some of the wetlands and other birding hotspots of west El Paso and southern Dona Ana County. Our exact itinerary will depend on where the best birds are reported in the days leading up to the trip, but likely destinations will include Crossroads Pond, Keystone Heritage Wetlands, and the Sunland Park river park. Bring along a snack and water, and be prepared for variable weather conditions. Since heavy traffic could complicate a lengthy caravan, we'll carpool as much as possible, and participation is limited to 15. Fillmore Canyon. February 18. This Dripping Springs-area trail has some moderate to difficult terrain. We'll meet at the Milagro Coffee end of the Pan-Am Plaza on E. University Ave. in Las Cruces at 6:30 AM and leave at 6:45. This will give us enough time to stop and explore some areas on the way up to the picnic area. Dripping Springs is a fee area, and it's \$3.00 per vehicle to get in. Water and sturdy footwear as well as sunscreen and a hat to shade you from the sun's rays are advisable. Those wanting to can make an entire day of it can explore the arroyo near La Cueva, the area around the Visitor's Center and other locations in Dripping Springs Natural Area. Christmas Bird Count Highlights

The 36th MVAS Las Cruces Christmas Bird Count was held 17 December. There were many surprises to this years' count, including 4 new species for the count: American White Pelican, Glaucous Gull, Bonaparte's Gull, and Williamson's Sapsucker.

Not only that, we had all-time "High Counts" for at

least 10 species, including Northern Shoveler, Green-winged Teal, Eurasian Collared-Dove, Ladder-backed Woodpecker, Say's Phoebe, Curve-billed Thrasher, Northern Mockingbird, Brewer's Blackbird, House Finch, and Lesser Goldfinch.

We also had "Low Counts" for a number of species including Loggerhead Shrike (only 7), Black-tailed Gnatcatcher, and Vesper Sparrow. And we completely missed 3 species for the first time ever: Common Gallinule (formerly known as Common Moorhen), Horned Lark (seen during count week), and Black-chinned Sparrow. About 25 to 30 species had numbers less than their 35-year average; however, about 40 species had counts higher than their 35-year average. These included Gambel's Quail (1.6x average), White-winged Dove (1.5x average), Cooper's Hawk (2x average), and Black-throated Sparrow (1.4x average).

And now for the biggest surprise of all (more of a shock really)—this was one of the best counts ever, with at least 120 species and 44,596 birds observed, plus 11 additional species during count week! I was completely taken by surprise while I tallied numbers and compared them to historic lists. For a full report of the results and for a little insight as to a couple of reasons why we may have ended up doing so well, be sure to check out the MVAS website where I hope to post a report very soon. Thanks again to everyone who participated!

The nominating committee will announce the slate of candidates for officer and board positions at the January MVAS program meeting. The annual election will be held at our February meeting.



With the help of your generous donations, Mesilla Valley Audubon Society continues to provide *Audubon Adventures* environmental education kits to interested 4th grade classrooms in elementary schools in Las Cruces and surrounding areas of southern New Mexico.

The title for the 2011-2012 classroom kit is “Feathers, Fur, Fins, and You.” Topics covered in the classroom materials include *Pollinators* (featuring hummingbirds and bees), *Wild Alaska*, *The Flow of Life* (featuring the rivers of North America), and *Caring for Our Planet*—a special Action for Planet Earth edition focusing on ways that young people can actively participate in conservation activities through Audubon.
