## **President's Message**

As I write this near the end of April, spring has sprung and we're well into the prime migration period for passerine birds. Here at home I've seen Orange-crowned, Virginia's, Yellow-rumped and Wilson's warblers, Hermit Thrushes and Blue-gray Gnatcatchers. These species are referred to as "Passage Migrants" and will hang around for a day or two and then move on. Other migrants have arrived too, but these will stay for the breeding season. In our yard these include Black-chinned Hummingbirds, Ash-throated Flycatchers, Western Kingbirds and Lesser Nighthawks.

My year-round birds are well into nesting season; the Curve-billed Thrashers I mentioned in the last newsletter are now feeding their lone fledgling and are beginning to make another nest. The Verdins completed their nest, filled it with 4 or so eggs and now are feeding the recent nestlings. The next few weeks are typically the most exciting for watching birds and other wildlife in the desert, so get out there and enjoy it!

## **Birdathon 2008: Birding for a Cause**

This year's Birdathon will take place between April 23 and May 8.

Birdathon is Audubon's largest annual fund raising event, and the world's largest birdwatching competition. Every year, thousands of people join to count birds, have fun, and raise vital funds for Audubon's mission of environmental conservation, education, and advocacy.

Here's how a Birdathon works: people count birds and collect pledges from sponsors based on the number of species they see. All you have to do is choose a date and start counting; you can pick whatever 24-hour period works best for you. You can count alone, in pairs, or with a group. You don't have to be an expert; some people do the Birdathon from their living room and count birds at their feeders; others may cover hundreds of miles in a day and see over 150 species. The key is to have fun.

If you don't want to participate as a counter, you can also contribute to the event just by pledging a certain amount per species or a flat amount to one of our counters.

Nationwide, last years' Birdathon helped raise over \$1 million. The funds raised by MVAS members are used locally, to support our Audubon Adventures environmental education program, which is providing educational materials for 86 local classrooms this year.

We hope you'll join with thousands of other participants in communities across the country who help make Birdathon a success.

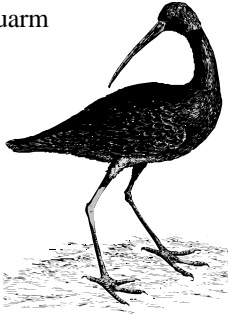

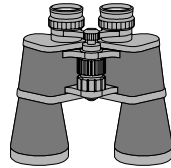
## Programs

Membership meetings and programs are held each month, at the *Village at Northrise, Hallmark Building, 2882 N. Roadrunner Pkwy.*

Meetings begin at 7:00 PM. Programs begin immediately following the business meeting and announcements.

**Birds of the Big Burro Mountains. June 18.** The Burros are a small range between Silver City and Lordsburg that reach just over 8,000 feet in elevation. The Burros contain ponderosa pine and pine-oak forests and have been little-studied by biologists. David Griffin conducted surveys there during Fall migration and Winter, and is currently surveying Spring migrants and breeding birds.

## Field Trips



Field trips are free and open to the general public. Entry fees to some areas may be required and driving costs are shared. On all field trips wear appropriate clothing and bring water and binoculars.

**Dams, Ditches & Driveways: May Migrants in Mesilla. May 24.** On this trip we'll visit local migrant hotspots in and around Mesilla. Spring migration will be nearing the end of its peak period here in the Mesilla Valley, but we should have no problem finding some interesting birds. We'll start by visiting the area around Mesilla Dam where there are relatively verdant ditches and canals that regularly harbor large numbers of migrants and resident breeding birds. Next we'll make our way to a few of the smaller, lushly-vegetated canals in Mesilla to continue our quest (last year we found a brilliant Rose-breasted Grosbeak here). We'll finish the morning with a nice stroll along the canals and roads in Mesilla Park, one of the Mesilla Valley's shadiest places and a great place to find birds in the spring.

Trip will depart at 6:30 AM from the Arroyo Plaza parking lot at 2001 E. Lohman Ave (meet near Wild Birds Unlimited). The trip will likely last until about noon, so bring snacks and a lunch, water, sun protection and be prepared for possible warm weather conditions. *Easy walking.*

**Alamogordo Area, March 22.** Fourteen birders met earlier than usual and headed east to the large natural playa and created wetland complex known as Holloman Lakes, and Oliver Lee Memorial State Park. A total of 52 species was observed: 34 at Holloman Lakes, and 24 at Oliver Lee.

At Holloman Lakes, the soft morning light and calm air allowed for great scope views of waterfowl and shorebirds, and it didn't take long for members to spot 6 Snowy Plovers on the nearby playa. Also on the playa was a pair of American Avocets, a few Killdeer, 6 Ring-billed Gulls, and a flock of small sandpipers. As we made our way to a cove we put our scopes on a large raft of ducks to the north: a big group of Lesser Scaup. With them were a few Ring-necked Ducks, 2 Gadwall, a couple of American Wigeon, and Cinnamon Teal. In the cove we had good looks at a pair of Bufflehead and 12 Eared Grebes. On our walk back across the levee we saw a group of 5 grebes floating to the north; they seemed to be 3 Western and 2 Clark's grebes.

We next headed southeast to Oliver Lee Memorial State Park at the foot of the Sacramento Mountains and the mouth of Dog Canyon. As we made our way through the desert scrub and down the trail toward the canyon, someone spotted a female Hairy Woodpecker - a real treat for us at such a low elevation. Other highlights included a Bewick's Wren and Orange-crowned Warbler.

After a nice lunch break in the group picnic area, we said our goodbyes and began the long journey home. When we turned north onto Hwy 54, people in our vehicle noticed a dark raptor perched on a power pole. As we headed back to the spot we could see another members' vehicle stopped and checking it out. The bird left its perch and flew west to another set of power poles, where we noticed 2 more raptors. We quickly got the scope on the birds and found them to be a group of Harris's Hawks! Hopefully other participants got a chance to see these beautiful birds. If not, this area, about 10 mi south of Alamogordo is traditionally one of the best places to find this species in New Mexico, so maybe you can take another trip and locate them.

**Mesilla Valley Bosque State Park. April 19.** An amazing 38 people showed up for today's field trip, even with a fair warning of possible ferocious mosquitoes. Were they lured by the avian riches of the Mesilla Valley Bosque State Park, or was it perhaps the early morning coffee and doughnuts provided by Kristi and Ken Lane of Wild Birds Unlimited? Either way, that's the biggest turnout we've had in recent times. Many thanks to Kristi and Ken for meeting the group way before regular business hours! John Douglas led the group, which consisted mostly of members, although a few non-members also attended. Participants got good looks at many of the regularly-occurring water species such as Mallard, Green-winged Teal, Great Blue Heron, and American Coot. Shorebirds were represented by Killdeer and Spotted Sandpiper. Secretive species such as Marsh Wren, Common Yellowthroat and Green-tailed Towhee were also observed. Raptors made a showing with Northern Harrier, Swainson's Hawk, Red-tailed hawk, and Prairie Falcon making the list. Flycatchers also were well-represented by Say's Phoebe, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Western Kingbird, and a surprise Scissor-tailed Flycatcher. Treetop gleaners included Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, and Bullock's Oriole; while ground feeders included Gambel's Quail, Green-tailed Towhee, Chipping Sparrow, White-crowned Sparrow, and Dark-eyed Junco.
