**Mesilla Valley Bosque State Park\***

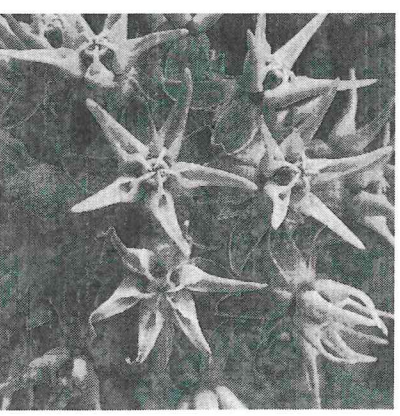
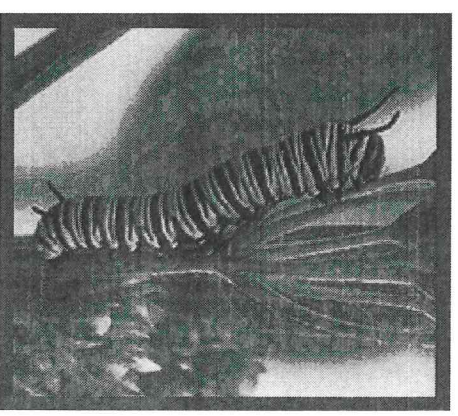
Every year Monarch butterflies execute a remarkable roundtrip, multi-generation, trans-continental migration. This migration allows them to grow their numbers in summer using North America's extensive milkweed populations, then escape fatally frigid conditions.

Monarch migration is well documented in the eastern United States and on the West Coast. But what about Monarchs in New Mexico? Do they migrate to or through New Mexico? How many? Do they breed here? Which milkweeds do Monarch caterpillars eat here? How can you support this unique natural phenomenon?

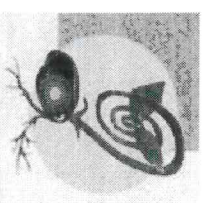
At this Workshop participants can:
