MVAS Programs

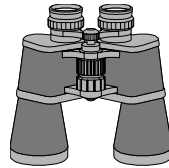

A National Monument for Our Own Backyard.

September 18. Nathan Small, with the New Mexico Wilderness Alliance, will introduce us to a number of the cultural and historic features within the proposed Organ Mountains – Desert Peaks National Monument, including the Butterfield Trail, petroglyphs and bedrock mortars, the Bartlett Conde International Boundary survey, Billy the Kid’s hideout at Outlaw Rock, and World War II-era aerial targets.

One thing we definitely have in common with our friends at NMDGF is a dislike for the game thief. C.J. Goin will lead this excursion to an area of Leasburg Dam State Park closed to the public. That and the fall migration should make for some good birding! The last time C.J. led a trip there, we saw a Blue-headed Vireo. We can’t promise a repeat performance, but who knows?! Bring plenty of water, binoculars, field guide and snacks, and dress in comfortable walking clothes. Wide-brimmed hats and sunscreen are also excellent ideas. We’ll meet at the parking lot of the K-Mart on Hwy 70 at 07:00 and leave at 07:15. We should be returning to Las Cruces by noon or shortly thereafter. Questions? Western Doña Ana County Grasslands. Saturday, October 19.

We’ll definitely go along Corralitos Ranch Road and, depending on time, the quality of the birding, and the inclinations of the participants, may go to Cold Iron Tank and Mason Draw as well. This is excellent grassland habitat, and in the past we’ve seen Lark Buntings; Lark, Grasshopper, Chipping, and several other sparrows; along with Horned Larks; Gambel’s and Scaled Quail; Swainson’s and Red-Tailed Hawks; Peregrine and Prairie Falcons; and Golden Eagles.

We’ll meet at 07:15 in the parking lot at Thomas Branigan Memorial Library, 200 E. Picacho Avenue, and leave at 07:30. Bring plenty of water, binoculars, field guide, snacks, and dress in comfortable walking clothes. Mexican Wolf Comments Due Sept. 11

Mesilla Valley Audubon Society, a chapter of the National Audubon Society, is a conservation and natural history organization in southern New Mexico that promotes appreciation and conservation of birds, other wildlife, and habitat, through environmental education, issue advocacy, and natural history experiences.

For those who missed the compelling presentation by Jean Ossorio at our August meeting, an important deadline for comments to improve the Mexican Wolf recovery program is September 11. Currently, wolves can only be directly released into a small area in Arizona. Support is needed to implement a proposed rule change that would allow captive-bred wolves to be released into the full recovery area, including portions of the Gila and Apache National Forests in New Mexico. This proposed rule change also represents an opportunity to request that released wolves be afforded more protections by allowing them to range outside of the designated recovery zone and by labeling their wild population “essential” instead of “non-essential” to the eventual recovery of this subspecies.
